Intent: My thesis identified a problem of social isolation within housing. The intent was to address this problem and propose a response. My thesis statement is: Establishing Roots: how housing can impact isolation and cultivate community to realize a social resilience.

Concept: The research identified community as a response to isolation. The concept was to design places that could support interaction and allow people's natural social tendencies to build community. In the parti, the concept is illustrated with the housing community raised on a semi-public ground plane with areas in between the built form allowing for interaction and place to be integrated. The raised ground plane defines the housing community through a threshold-like experience allowing space below for the broader community to connect in the form of Third Places.

Process: Once the research was complete and the site chosen, the process began by sketching the programming on the site to determine a efficient layout that also met the design intent. Through this process I was challenged to determine whether the design options were feasible. I completed a high level proforma and compared it to the existing building on the site. I found it was a economically feasible. 3D modelling and rendering software helped demonstrate the design intent.

Resolution: The resolution establishes that housing can encourage interaction which in turn can cultivate community and result in an outcome of social resilience. Community can be cultivated through strategies of fostering circulation, where chance encounters can occur, providing places for activities as transitional areas off of circulation paths within a physical and social scale that allows for connection between people. When place is integrated in the form of light, air, nature, materiality and shared culture, it can improve the spatial quality and increase the likelihood of attracting people to public areas. All of which breaks down inadvertent barriers to social connection helping people establish roots in their community.















Site

Located at the corner of Rosemount Ave and Wellington St W, the project is a reinterpretation of the site with a community cultivated, socially resilient housing




Move 1

Lift ground plane to provide continuity of Public Realm for Third Places and by doing so, create a semi-private residential level a platform for circulation and everday activities




Move 2

Place building mass at the street to establish a boundry for the residential level as well as maintaining a physical human scale




Multi-Storey 2 Bed Single Level Flat Units

Move 3


Create openings for circulation and everday activities to cultivate community as well as address spatial quality by integrating place with light, air, and nature. Allows for individualization, reducing monotony



































2 Bed Flat Interior Ground Unit
